youth and young adults at Asbury United Methodist Church. I became familiar with Methodist Family Health during my time at Asbury, and when the director of pastoral care position became available, it was something I knew I wanted to explore.

Q: What made you want to pursue a career working with kids?

A: I've always enjoyed working with children, youth and young adults. Once they know you really care about them, they are so open to hearing what you have to say, and they aren't afraid to express their thoughts and questions. One of my favorite things about this position is that, in the course of a normal week, I am able to minister to six-year-olds to 36-year-olds and all ages in between. Our programs at the Methodist Children's Home, Methodist Behavioral Hospital and Arkansas CARES are all so different, but I enjoy them all.

Q: What goals do you have for working with our clients?

A: We developed a spiritual mission statement for Methodist Family Health a couple of months ago: the spiritual mission of Methodist Family Health is for those receiving our help to find the love, worth and acceptance offered by God, along with the resources to help them grow as they begin or continue their spiritual journey to wellness. My goals are aligned with our mission statement—I want to be sure our kids understand (as much as any of us can understand) the love that God has for each of them.

Q: What has been the highlight of your time with Methodist Family Health so far?

A: There have been a few times where I felt I saw some life change happen. You can tell by conversation when someone actually "gets" what you are talking about, and it's so encouraging to have clients make that

New Residential Treatment Center Set to Open in September

Methodist Family Health will move residents into its new psychiatric residential treatment center at its Fillmore campus in Little Rock in September. This state-of-the-art



residential treatment center houses what was formally offered in five separate buildings - three housing units, a school and a gym - at Methodist Children's Home, which has been in operation for a century. This new facility will be more efficient, providing better service to children, families and staff, and the other buildings will remain to be used for other purposes.

The building is two stories and encompass 33,625 sq. ft. Methodist Family Health originally expected to open the doors of this new facility in January 2019 but is welcoming residents five months sooner.
