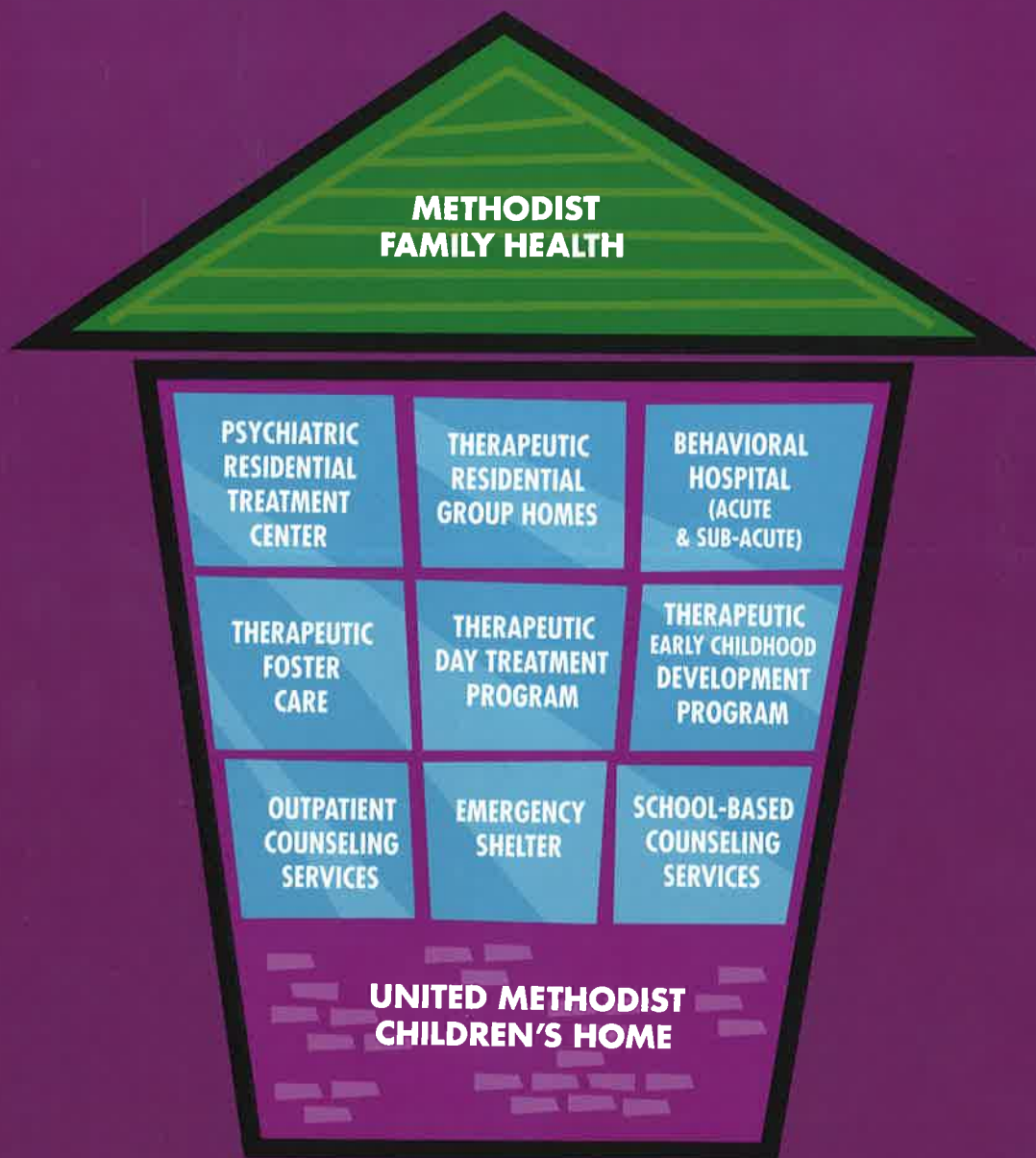



*To those served, we will:*

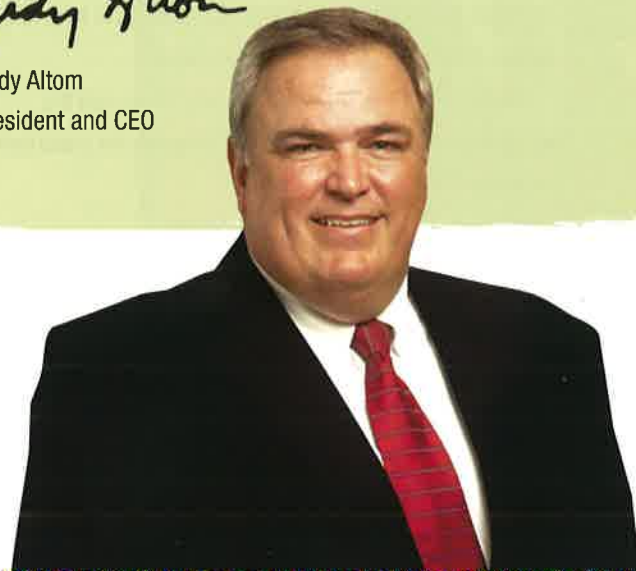
- *show concern for the whole person: socially, emotionally, and spiritually;*

# Delta Gets New Home

The newest Teaching Family Home in the Methodist Family Health system was unveiled during an open house December 4. Located in Phillips County in eastern Arkansas, the Ophelia Polk Moore Home is situated on Latour Road (County Road 251) in Lexa.

The facility has been designated a girls' home and can house up to eight at-risk youth, ranging in age from 12 to 17.

The residential therapeutic group foster home is part of the United Methodist Children's Home ministry. It is a joint venture between Methodist Family Health and St. Francis Ministries of Helena-West Helena. The nonprofit St. Francis Ministries secured funds to construct the spacious home with seven bedrooms and six bathrooms, while Methodist Family Health agreed to provide staffing and services for the care and treatment of residents.

"The whole community has been involved," said Pat Freemyer of Helena-West Helena, a member of Helena United Methodist Church and the St. Francis Ministries board.

"There's a great need" for foster care in the Delta region, she said. "We hope to meet the needs of girls who, for some reason, have no home. Our mission is to provide a more stable life for these young ladies."

Methodist Family Health CEO Andy Altom said the addition of the Lexa home gives the agency an important presence in the Delta.

"This is an underserved area that we really wanted to help," he said. The home and its services "will be positive for the area ... and we're excited to be there."

Lesa and Nathan Henry are the teaching parents who will direct programs at the new facility. Their family includes 18-month-old daughter Madeline.

The newly constructed home also features a handi-capped accessible bath, a full laundry with two washers and dryers, a spacious kitchen and dining area, great room with three distinct activity areas and a private study.

Kathy Campbell and Bennett Morris selected the decor and furnishings. Bob Wright supervised the lawn care and landscaping of the grounds. Buddy Waddell helped in locating property and the plans for the home. All are members of the St. Francis Ministries board.

"We are all so excited," Freemyer said. "It's a lovely home, and we all shed tears at the opening."

The home is named for the daughter of Naomi H. Moore, who in 1892 pledged \$1,200 for the purpose of establishing a home for orphans. The rector, wardens and vestry of St. John's Episcopal Church in Helena were named trustees of the gift. An orphanage was constructed and began operating in 1893. Over the years, as the needs of children and youth changed, the original home ceased operating and the Ophelia Moore Memorial Trust was established.

In 2001, St. John's rector Duane Saba organized St. Francis Ministries for the purpose of offering outreach and enrichment programs for children of Phillips County. The St. Francis board of directors concluded that the establishment of a group foster home would meet the requirements of the Ophelia Polk Moore Memorial Trust, so members requested and were granted funds needed to construct a facility to be used for this purpose.

Then, with Freemyer providing introductions to the Methodist agency, St. Francis Ministries entered into an agreement with Methodist Family Health to manage the facility.

"We think it's a win-win situation," Altom said. Services for at-risk youth are sorely needed in the region, he said, and "it's great for us to have an opportunity to expand our footprint in the state into the Delta."

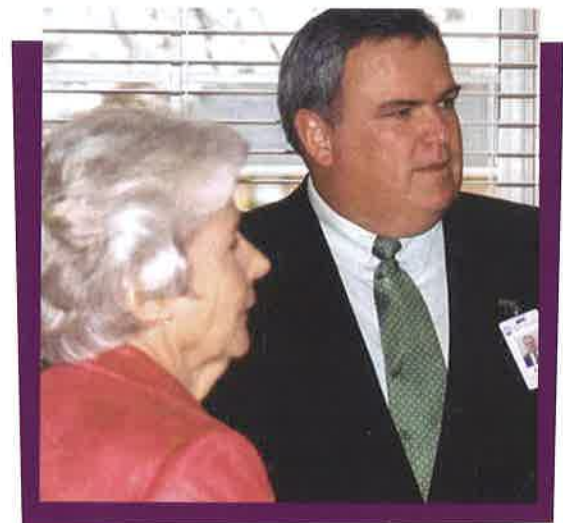
Methodist Family Health operates seven other therapeutic group homes — one each in Fayetteville, Springdale, Batesville, Searcy and Little Rock and two in Magnolia. The agency also manages United Methodist Behavioral Hospital Inc. in Maumelle and is supported by Methodist Family Health Foundation Inc.

The agency serves more than 200 children daily through its emergency shelter, therapeutic group homes, foster care programs, and psychiatric hospital, and has more than 200 employees.

# to Last

**Marcus Meadows was fast on his way to becoming another tragic statistic. Enter Methodist Family Health and the discovery of a new life now full of hope.**

**M**arcus Meadows is a 23-year-old senior at Arkansas State University in Jonesboro, where in a few months, he will earn his degree in sports management. He shares an apartment with a friend, and in the mornings before class, he unloads freight at UPS for money to pay the bills. On the surface, this story resembles thousands of others found on college campuses across the country. But look just below, and you'll find that Marcus Meadows' journey from Little Rock to Batesville to Jonesboro covered infinitely more than the 120 miles painted on the roadside signs.

Common sense and the experts tell us that growing up in a single-parent home is tough on a kid. Call it a built-in disadvantage. What those same experts with their data and statistics don't know is what it's like for that child when his single parent also happens to be blind. Marcus knows, though, because he was that little boy. And when that's the hand you've been dealt, you don't stay a little boy for long. Life – real life, the type not meant for children – gets in the way of watching cartoons and playing chase. Responsibilities replace recreation because, instead of being taken care of, you share the grown-up role of caregiver.

"I had to grow up faster than most kids," Marcus says. "I was the only one around to take care of my mom. Being a kid, that was really hard. I got involved with the wrong crowd and started getting into trouble. I took advantage of my mom, and I'm not proud of that. Eventually, she couldn't handle dealing with it all, so she had me sent away to different facilities. I'd stay at those places for a little while, come back home, then do it all over again. Finally, the courts gave me a choice: Methodist Family Health or jail. Well, I sure didn't want to go to jail."

Methodist Family Health operates seven therapeutic residential group homes in Arkansas, with the mission to rebuild the lives of children who have emotional and behavioral problems. Each home is run by teaching parents – a married couple living in the home with their own children – who provide a stable environment in which troubled youth ages 12 to 18 can experience healthy family interactions and learn to manage their emotions and behaviors. It was at the group home in Batesville that Marcus met his teaching parents, Joe and Wilma Pike.

"When Marcus came into our home, he was in need of supervision and structure more than anything else," Wilma says. "But right away, he was very respectful and eager to excel in school. I'll tell you this: Marcus did a lot for himself; he deserves a lot of credit. It's kids like him who have inspired my husband and me to be in this ministry for the past 18 years. Just being able to provide these children with a safe environment, teaching them the right way to do things, and then watching them become successful – it just brings a smile to your face."

For 12-year-old Marcus, life in Batesville was completely foreign to the one he left behind in Little Rock. And he didn't exactly welcome the adjustments. For starters, he was now under the watchful eyes of two strangers who had strict rules to follow. Instead of being the only child, he was now sharing space with sometimes as many as six other kids. Gone were the days of coming and going as he pleased. Also gone were the friends who had added to his troubles back home.

"Honestly, at first it was hard to adjust," Marcus says. "I was used to being an only child, and sharing wasn't something I had really mastered. I got in trouble a lot in

the beginning, but things got easier pretty quick. I started to make friends and got used to the rules. Plus, I had the greatest teaching parents I could have possibly had. Joe and Wilma Pike ... I got attached to them. They laid down the law from day one, and I really matured as a person."

Marcus flourished in his new surroundings. He enjoyed his home and going to school and became an inspiration to others. At Batesville High School, Marcus excelled in sports – another healthy outlet – and was named all-district and all-state in football as a fullback and linebacker. And somewhere along the way, Marcus lost all resemblance to the child who once found trouble at every turn and learned there are rules that everyone has to follow in life. Or, as Marcus puts it, "Methodist Family Health taught me how to make it."

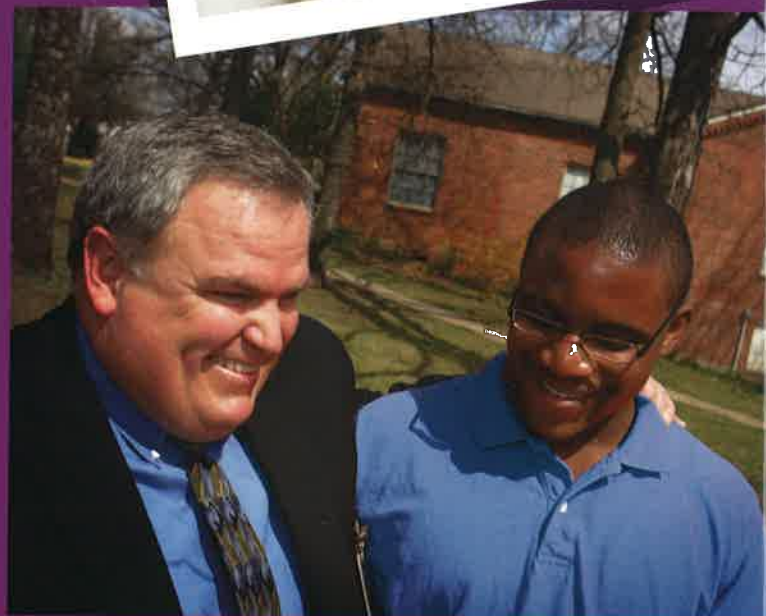
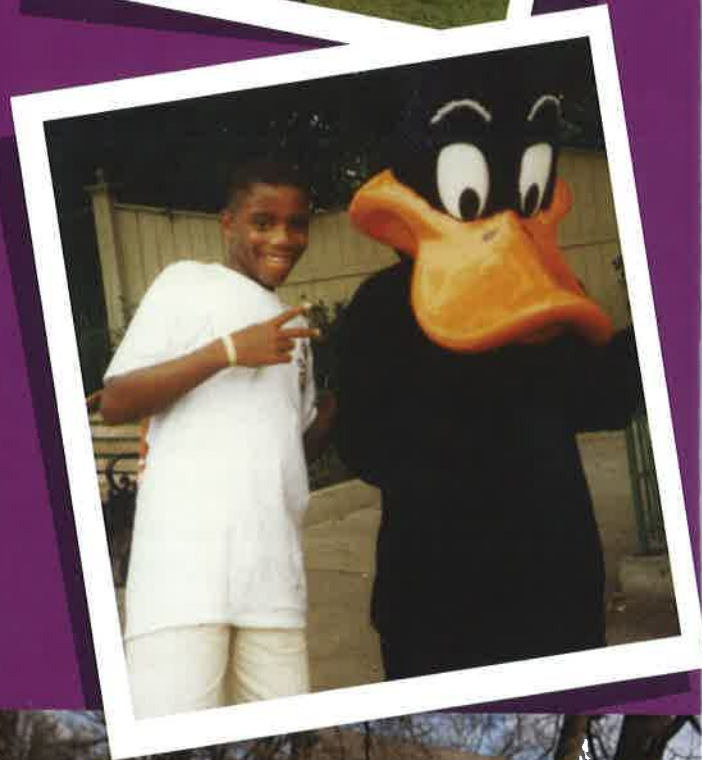
Craig Gammon, director of residential services, believes in the mission of Methodist Family Health because he's witnessed firsthand the transformations – of Marcus and many others like him who have beaten the odds.

"As an organization, one of the things we keep fighting for through our growth and expansion is maintaining that sense of family and community, and we've done that," Gammon says. "When I go to work, I say, 'I'm going to help these kids' lives, so that when they leave, they're going to have a better chance at making something of themselves.' "

Even if her sight were miraculously restored, Marcus' mother would scarcely recognize the young man who once added to her already heavy burden. But today, even in her blindness, she can clearly see that Craig's hope has become Marcus' reality – her son has made something of himself.

When Marcus Meadows walks across that stage in cap and gown to accept his diploma, his will be but one of the many stories found there that day. But his story – of what can happen when a kid is given even half a chance – is ultimately a story of redemption. How a young boy fast on his way to becoming another grim statistic became the first and only in his family to receive a college degree. No, to *earn* a college degree.

"Methodist Family Health kept me alive," Marcus says. "If it wasn't for them, I'd probably be dead. They helped me mature, they prepared me for college, they helped me find a job, they even helped me set up my bank account and showed me how to pay bills. I'm real close to my mom now, and thanks to the folks at Methodist Family Health, I learned what it means to be a family. They changed my life forever."

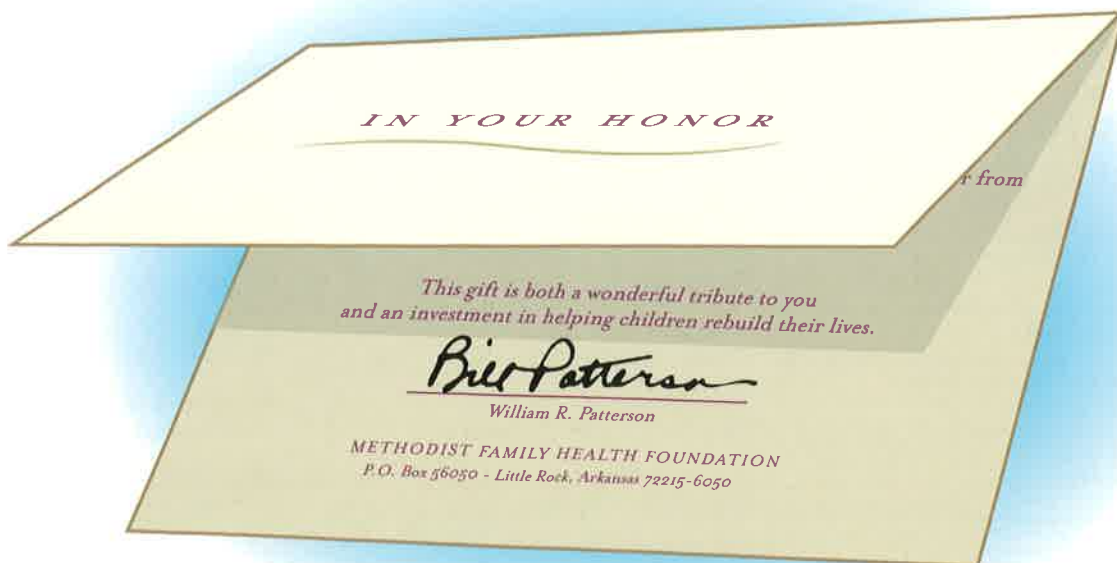

## THE GEORGE THORNBURGH SOCIETY

Colonel George Thornburgh, Methodist layman and successful businessman, is generally regarded as the founder of the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage. Beginning in 1909, while serving as the third superintendent of the orphanage, he led one of the earliest fund drives in Arkansas, an ambitious and successful \$25,000 campaign to erect a new facility to serve as a modern new home of the orphanage.

# New Donor Recognition Groups Unveiled

Three new donor recognition societies have been established by Methodist Family Health Foundation to recognize generous supporters of the growing agency that has its roots in the 1899 Methodist Orphanage.

Methodist Family Health is the corporate name for the agency that manages United Methodist Children's Home Inc., United Methodist Behavioral Hospital Inc. and Methodist Family Health Foundation Inc. The hospital is located in Maumelle. Therapeutic group homes that come under the Children's Home banner are located in Fayetteville, Springdale, Batesville, Searcy, Little Rock and Magnolia.

During ceremonies November 20 in Little Rock, recognition plaques were unveiled for the three donor recognition societies. They are:

- the James M. Workman Society, recognizing gifts to Methodist Family Health of \$1,000 or more;
- the George Thornburgh Society, recognizing gifts of \$25,000 or more; and
- the Coy-Roots-Tabor Heritage Society, recognizing commitments to a future gift to the agency.

Workman was pastor of Little Rock's Asbury Methodist Church in 1899 when the Methodist Orphanage was chartered and was the first Agent of the orphanage.

Thornburgh was a noted Methodist layman who is considered founder of the orphanage.

The third society honors three women who were among the earliest benefactresses of the orphanage and who donated the property on which the first building was constructed in 1902.

The societies have been created "in recognition of the wonderful heritage of support given to our children over the last century," said Bill Patterson, Methodist Family Health vice president for advancement.

Methodist Family Health supporters on hand to assist with the unveiling were Liz and John Workman, Patsy and Jeff Farris and Judith and Charles Long.

"What you donors do for us allows us to do a lot for children in this state," Ritter Arnold, chairman of the

Methodist Family Health Foundation, remarked to a gathering of about 70 supporters and agency staffers at a reception at the Country Club of Little Rock.

The agency serves more than 200 children daily through its emergency shelter, therapeutic group homes, foster care programs, and psychiatric hospital. The agency has more than 200 employees.

While the focus has shifted from caring for orphans to helping youngsters with emotional and behavioral problems, "we have had consistent programs and a mission that never once stopped in 103 years," said president and CEO Andy Altom. "We are still helping children and families."

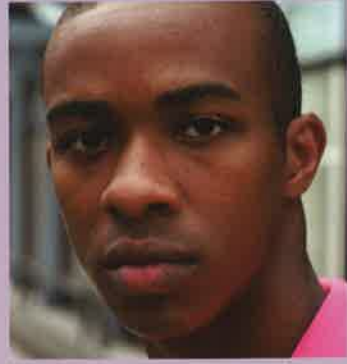
