
The mission of Methodist Family Health has been and always will be to rebuild the lives of children.

Giving New Life to Women and Families

Did you know more mothers abuse drugs than women without children? Or that substance abuse is considered to be our nation's number one healthcare issue?

But sometimes a statistic just doesn't strike a nerve. It doesn't hit home the way a real story does. A Kathleen Nicks kind of story.

You see, Kathleen Nicks was an addict. She would take shots of meth in her arm while lying next to the toilet because she knew that she would immediately throw up as the drug hit her bloodstream. Oh, and she was pregnant at the time.

Fortunately, for Kati Nicks and thousands of women like her who all too often lose their battles with drug and alcohol addictions, there is hope. And it can be found right here in Arkansas.

The Arkansas Center for Addictions Research, Education and Services (Arkansas CARES) is a comprehensive family treatment program that focuses on breaking the cycle of addiction for mothers. Established in 1992 within the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences, the program found a new owner and permanent home at the United Methodist Children's Home in Little Rock effective January 1 of this year. Driven by their mission — to provide a family-centered approach to decrease maternal substance abuse and to promote healthy family outcomes through prevention, treatment education, research and advocacy — Arkansas CARES serves addicted mothers, their children and their families.

Most women enter the program either pregnant or with young children. They are usually single, poor and unemployed with health problems and legal difficulties ranging from child-protection cases to drug-related arrests. From childcare and parenting support to mental health services and

job-preparedness training, Arkansas CARES specializes in guiding families through recovery to a full and healthy life.

"UAMS started Arkansas CARES to address a community need, and we are proud that it has grown into such an effective program," said G. Richard Smith, M.D., chairman of the Department of Psychiatry in the UAMS College of Medicine. "The Arkansas CARES residential program has been housed at the United Methodist Children's Home for several years now. Arkansas CARES is an exceptional program that will further enhance the mission of the Methodist Family Health Continuum of Care."

Arkansas CARES is a four-to-six month program, where women learn not only how to overcome their addictions and stay sober, but receive counseling on parenting, relationships, family, communication, and job skills. About 80 percent of the women who complete treatment remain drug-free a year later.

"Arkansas CARES is an outstanding program that complements our services for helping children and families in a residential setting," said Andy Altom, chief executive officer of Methodist Family Health, the parent company of the United Methodist Children's Home. "UAMS will continue to be a partner in our programs, and we anticipate a smooth transition for Arkansas CARES."

So what about Kati Nicks, the expecting mother we last saw with a needle in her arm and her mind focused on where and when she would get her next chemical fix? Thanks to Arkansas CARES, and her personal strength, her life took a remarkable turn for the better.

After stays in nine different rehab centers and spurned by her family that no longer wanted her around, Kati fled her home state of Washington and traveled to Arkansas with her

brother/fellow addict. Different state, same demons. Her life was spiraling further out of control, only this time drugs would become only part of the torture. She was running with the wrong crowd, junkies whose lives consisted of drugs, crime and violence. She soon found her bad situation getting worse and in yet another destructive relationship with a man who abused her emotionally, sexually and physically. Like with the drugs, it was a cycle that seemingly had no end.

"I was molested as a four-year-old by a male relative, and my father committed suicide when I was nine," explained Kati. "I made a promise right then that I would never love again. I would never allow anyone to hurt me like that again. Needless to say, life went blank after that for a while — a long while. I started smoking my step-dad's cigarettes when I was in the seventh grade, even though I couldn't stand the taste. I just thought I was cool, and it got me new older friends. Just a few months later, I was smoking pot on a regular basis. I found acceptance in the drug world of my friends, and I liked the attention."

For the next several years, Kati lived an X-rated life.

Too many details for this space, so here's the short version: alcohol, drugs, crime, sex, violence, rape. Repeat. Faced with a jail sentence for being arrested for drug possession, Kati was given a choice — incarceration or rehabilitation.

She eagerly chose the latter.

That's when the sun begins to shine on this story, aka the life of Kathleen Nicks. She figured Arkansas CARES would be nothing more than another pit stop, another ritual of going through the motions and saying the right things to make the "experts" proud of themselves. What she discovered was far from a facility; it was a place where lives were transformed.

"For the first time in my life, I was diagnosed with both depression and addiction and received treatment for both," Kati said. "The medication I received to treat my depression made an immediate impact. See, the root of my problems was the fact that I didn't want to feel anything. That's why I would turn to drugs, to avoid having to deal with life. At Arkansas CARES, they taught me how to think through things, how to deal with my emotions, how to deal with life.

I felt worthless when I got there, like I didn't belong in this world. They helped me find my place in life."

Kati delivered her third child, Nick, during her 12-month stay at Arkansas CARES. It's been four years since they left, and Nick's mom is sober and happy for the first time in her life. They are back in Washington where Kati lives with her new husband and her three kids: Tayler, 11; Lauren, 6; and Nick, who is now 5.


"I'm married to a wonderful man, and I'm close to my family once again," the new Kati says. "I even live across the street from my mom. My husband, Pat, is in the process of adopting my three children, and I'm so blessed to have a life worth living again."

Kati's focus is on the here and now, but she doesn't run from the past that still sometimes haunts her. She wants her story told. She wants others to know they too can beat the odds.

"Arkansas CARES taught me how to live again, they taught me how to be a mother," Kati says through tears.

"How could I possibly ever thank them enough for making me feel worthy enough to live. I had hurt so many people, but they made me feel like life was worth living. I hope other women receive what I did there. I tried every avenue to get help but didn't get it until I found Arkansas CARES. I know there are other women out there who can get the help I have and live a life they never thought possible. I have my family together, and we work very hard on being the best parents we can be for our children. You know, I didn't think I could

handle being a mother when I arrived at Arkansas CARES.
I almost gave Tayler and Lauren up for adoption. The staff at Arkansas CARES helped me overcome my fears, grow and learn how to love and be loved. I am so blessed and so thankful."

Our last stop was the Methodist Behavioral Hospital in Maumelle, and once again, we were very impressed. We were also treated to a delicious lunch and discussed ways to let more people know about Methodist Family Health, all their services and their needs. Therapeutic Foster Care Program Celebrates 5-Year Anniversary

January 2007 marked the fifth anniversary of the Methodist Family Health Therapeutic Foster Care Program.

Originally, the idea was to have just a few homes – four, or perhaps six at most. Three weeks prior to the start of the new TFC program, however, the opportunity to serve took an immediate surge.

A TFC provider in Texarkana was dropping its program, and MFH was asked to take over and maintain the 13 children previously in that provider's care. MFH agreed and started down a very different path than the original plan.

A flurry of activity followed – it was a learning experience at warp speed. But the program did get underway – in days rather than weeks. And despite some initial bumps in the road it was off to a successful start, and it has become a wonderful and highly successful part of our Continuum of Care.

Five children from the program have been adopted over the past five years, and all of them are still doing well in the adopted families.

Also, a number of the youngsters have graduated and gone on to college or other post-secondary schooling. Some have even reunited with relatives.

Donor Spotlight

John and Liz Workman

Contributing a lasting legacy for the children of Arkansas

ore than a hundred years ago, Reverend James M. Workman helped lay the foundation for what was to become the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage. Two generations later, another Workman is following the family tradition of helping to rebuild the lives of children.

John S. Workman was born in 1927 in Fayetteville, Arkansas, and like his grandfather and father before him, served as pastor to several Methodist churches in Arkansas. After a 20-year stint in the ministry, John, with the encouragement of the Bishop, embarked on a second career in journalism.

"I had done some writing for the *Arkansas Methodist* newspaper, and when their editor died, the Bishop asked me to take over," Workman said.

John continued as the paper's editor for the next six years before accepting an offer to become religion editor of the *Arkansas Gazette* – the only position of its kind in Arkansas – where he worked until retiring some 12 years later. It was his career as a writer that afforded John with the opportunity to keep a close watch on the ongoing ministry of the United Methodist Children's Home – the new name of the organization his grandfather helped start so many years before.

"Through the years, United Methodist Children's Home was *the* outstanding service ministry of the Methodist church," John said. "As editor of the *Arkansas Methodist*, I would write a big feature story every year about them to showcase all the wonderful work they were doing."

Fast-forward to 2005. To commemorate and celebrate John's grandfather's work in helping to establish the original orphanage, the administration of Methodist Family Health Foundation formed a society to honor the late Reverend Workman. Today, members of the James M. Workman Society are recognized for annual gifts of

\$1,000 or more, which support the many ministries within the Methodist Family Health Continuum of Care. As you might expect, John and his wife, Liz, are proud members.

"As Methodist Family Health continued to grow and expand its outreach, Liz and I certainly wanted to financially support their efforts," John said. "They have such a great reputation and are respected among all denominations and all children's health facilities. We're very proud to be involved, and proud of our family's association. We're excited about the continued growth and the number of children being served. We are so grateful to be a part of something that has touched lives the way Methodist Family Health has."



What is the Big Dam Bridge?

Located across Murray Lock and Dam in Little Rock, the Big Dam Bridge is the newest bridge to span the Arkansas River. It is open to pedestrian and bicycle traffic only, and at 3,463 linear feet in length (3/4 of a mile), the bridge is the longest pedestrian-only bridge built for that purpose in North America.

What is the Big Dam Bridge Walk for Children?

Simply stated, it's a new tradition for youth designed to help children in need. By giving of their time and energy and by becoming involved in this outreach of Methodist Family Health, youth groups and individuals will be helping to rebuild the lives of children who have suffered from abandonment, neglect or physical, emotional and/or sexual abuse. The donations collected will go directly toward providing assistance to the young men and women in the care of Methodist Family Health all across Arkansas.

Sanctioned by the Arkansas Conference Council on Youth Ministry, the walk will be held preceding the statewide youth Wild River Country Lock-in on August 3. Food and entertainment will be provided for the walkers.

A group of us from the fundraising profession recently had the opportunity to visit with Lance Armstrong, the seven-time Tour de France champion and, more importantly, a cancer survivor who has since helped to raise nearly \$100 million for cancer research.

Armstrong is low-key yet powerful in his words. The most striking thing he said, in my opinion, was the following: "The difference between what we know about a problem and what we do to resolve it is a *moral* issue."
