
Arkansas's United Methodist Churches Shine Light of Peace, Stability and Hope

Methodist Family Health Foundation recognizes the essential connection between the local church and the transformational ministry of caring for children and their families. Since 1899, Methodist Family Health has helped rebuild the lives of Arkansas children and their families. These children have been abandoned, abused, neglected, and are dealing with psychiatric, behavioral, emotional and spiritual issues. For more than 122 years, the connection with local churches has been strong, and together, we strive to make the bond even stronger.

Each year, hundreds of congregations across Arkansas enter bold partnerships with Methodist Family Health Foundation to make the continuum of care as effective and broad-based as it is today. Methodist Family Health receives no apportionment support from the Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church. Instead, we rely heavily on our individual partnerships with local churches. Church congregations find ways, literally, of being "the hands and feet of Jesus" as children and their families are cared for and even transformed from the brokenness they have suffered.

Arkansas congregations step up to the front lines when they reach out to Methodist Family Health Foundation at Christmastime and myriads of other ways,

METHODIST FAMILY HEALTH PROMOTES SMITH, ADDS MATTOX, ENGLERT-JESSEN TO TEAM

Methodist Family Health recently promoted Amanda Bolls Smith, CFRE to executive director of Methodist Family Health Foundation, and it hired Rev. Dr. Michael Mattox as church relations associate and Rev. Eva Englert-Jessen as director of pastoral care.

Amanda Smith is a native Arkansan, born and raised in Little Rock. She grew up in Pulaski Heights United Methodist Church and graduated from Little Rock Central High School. She earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in sociology with a minor in psychology. Smith went on to work at an advertising firm in Little Rock then moved to a position with the March of Dimes where, she says, she "accidentally fell" into the nonprofit and fundraising world. Now, 21 years later, Smith cannot imagine being in any other profession, as the nonprofit world is in her heart and blood.

Over the course of those 21 years, Smith worked for several local nonprofits, raising funds and awareness for their missions, including American Heart Association, Baptist Health Foundation and now Methodist Family Health Foundation. Smith has been with Methodist Family Health Foundation for more than two years and absolutely loves the mission and scope of her work. She is honored to play a role in developing partnerships and helping to raise necessary funds which provides needed care and therapy for children and families across Arkansas. Smith recently earned her certification as a fundraising executive and was formerly the director of development at Methodist Family Health Foundation.

Rev. Dr. Mattox has a Doctor of Ministry from Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, TX; a Master of Divinity from St. Paul School of Theology in Kansas City, MO; and a Bachelor of Arts in religion from Hendrix College in Conway, AR.

Retiring in 2020, Rev. Dr. Mattox most recently served as senior pastor at First United Methodist Church in Rogers, AR. In addition to this appointment, Rev. Dr. Mattox also served at First United Methodist Church in Hot Springs, First United Methodist Church of Little Rock, and was the district superintendent for the Arkansas Episcopal Area of the United Methodist Church in Little Rock. He also most recently served on the operations board of directors at Methodist Family Health.

Rev. Englert-Jessen is a third-generation clergywoman in the United Methodist Church. In June 2021, she became an ordained deacon in the Methodist church, and she has a Master of Divinity from Boston University School of Theology and a bachelors from Hendrix College in Conway.

shining a light on what might otherwise be a dark and lonely hour. The continuum of care involves many ways of meeting a child at his or her greatest point of need. Whether that be school based counseling clinics or day treatment programs; the Kaleidoscope Grief Center or the Methodist Behavioral Hospital; the Arkansas CARES program or group homes throughout the state, the local church finds it can provide quality care for children and their families when partnering with Methodist Family Health Foundation.

Some local churches receive Christmas offerings on the Sundays before Christmas or Christmas Eve. Other churches get involved with making blankets and providing gifts for children who might otherwise have nothing. Other churches come alongside Methodist Family Health Foundation at various times of the year, providing necessities such as clothes, shoes, personal hygiene items, school supplies, bedding and more through the Get Up and Give Campaign.

What all that teaches us here at Methodist Family Health Foundation is that we are on the front lines together—caring for children and their families in the way Jesus taught us. Through those financial gifts and those countless deeds of kindness, we are responding boldly to Jesus's teaching: "For I was hungry, and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." (Matthew 25:35, NRSV) We at Methodist Family Health Foundation appreciate our church partners. Goal Achieved During 2021 Giving Tuesday


