Janet Breen, LPC Kaleidoscope Grief Center

It takes a special person to work with children and families who are grieving the loss of a loved one. Janet Breen knows what it takes to help children and families cope with the unthinkable, and she has been doing just this for more than two decades. As a licensed professional counselor, Janet works with Arkansas children as a counselor at Methodist Family Health's counseling clinic in Little Rock. She also is the program coordinator for Kaleidoscope Grief Center, a program of Methodist Family Health, which promotes the process of healing through education, therapeutic and recreational services, grief support programs and traditional counseling.

CAMP HEALING HEARTS

Helps Grieving Arkansas Children, Families Reflect, Reconnect and Rediscover

FREE Grief Day Camp Set for Sat., May 21, 2022

After two years of dormancy because of the COVID-19 pandemic, Methodist Family Health's Camp Healing Hearts is back this year with a day camp for Arkansas children and families struggling with grief. Coordinated by Kaleidoscope Grief Center, which is a program of Methodist Family Health, Camp Healing Hearts is FREE to families attending and will begin at 8 a.m. on Sat., May 21 at Camp Aldersgate in Little Rock. This camp is open to any family in Arkansas who is grieving the death of a loved one.

Losing a loved one is difficult for everyone, and grieving that loss is essential to accepting painful feelings and creating an opportunity for growth and a new sense of normal. Camp Healing Hearts is for Arkansas children ages 5 to 18 and their families who have lost a loved one and are coping with grief and bereavement. Utilizing both therapy and recreation, Camp Healing Hearts offers children and families an opportunity to discover their own inner strength.

The camp includes heart-to-heart time, swimming, fishing, crafts, games, campfires and s'mores and much more. An adult caregiver is required to accompany the grieving child or children attending camp. Only 100 spaces are available so those interested in attending are encouraged to complete and return an application prior to the deadline, which is 4:30 p.m., Thurs., May 5.

Camp Healing Hearts is made possible by community partners in the Alliance for Grief and Loss, including Arkansas Children's Hospital, Little Rock School District, Pulaski County Special School District, Griffin-Leggett Funeral Homes and the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences.

"More than a million children nationwide will lose a parent by age 15," Janet explained. "Research shows the death of a parent may be the most traumatic single event to affect the well-being and health of a developing child. Adult depression, schizophrenia, drug problems and alcohol use may be linked to childhood bereavement. Many more will lose siblings, other relatives, caregivers and close friends. These profound losses affect daily lives, academic and social functioning, and growth toward adulthood."

To assist loved ones to mourn their loss in a healthy way, Janet and a team of volunteers provide several resources – all free of charge. Any child and his or her family throughout Arkansas can participate in peer support bereavement groups, which are held twice monthly and provide age-appropriate peer support for children ages 5-18 and their caregivers. These groups provide a safe place to nurture the expression of feelings to promote the healing process after the death of a loved one. Kaleidoscope Kids Club offers quarterly social events chaperoned by staff and volunteers, which allow opportunities for fun when sadness seems to prevail. Kids Club events are open to any child or teen who is or has been enrolled in any of our programs. Bereavement counseling with a licensed clinician is available for children and families facing critical or terminal illness.

Perhaps the event the kids in our Kaleidoscope Grief Center look most forward to is Camp Healing Hearts, which is a free, family-oriented grief camp for children ages 5-18 and their families. Because grief can be a very isolating experience, particularly for children, Camp Healing Hearts provides a safe environment where children and their families can develop coping skills — both individually and within a community of others. After two years of dormancy because of the COVID-19 pandemic, Methodist Family Health's Camp Healing Hearts is back this year with a day camp, which will begin at 8 a.m. on Sat., May 21 at Camp Aldersgate in Little Rock. Progress Continues on the Mike Millar Spiritual Life Center at Methodist Family Health's Oldest Campus

In 2019, Methodist Family Health Foundation launched a capital campaign to raise \$4,256,175 to construct the Mike Millar Spiritual Life Center on the Fillmore campus in Little Rock. With funds pledged and secured, the ground was broken in October 2021. The new multipurpose building is named in honor of Mike Millar, a devout United Methodist and noted attorney in Searcy, as well as a longtime board chair, board member, donor and supporter of Methodist Family Health. The new building will include a chapel, multipurpose space, a welcome center and office space for all Methodist Children's Home administrators. In addition, the multipurpose center will include an outdoor labyrinth for prayer and meditation, new landscaping and a dedicated parking lot. The building will be 5,118 square feet and is scheduled for completion in fall 2022. We thank all the donors to this capital campaign who made the Mike Millar Spiritual Life Center a reality. Because of your partnership and generosity, the Arkansas children and families in our care will have access to an amazing facility.




